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Engineering in local language? Report card shows more takers in TN, Andhra, UP

recruiters across four states to find what's behind the uptick and where the challenges lie, from availability of non-English textbooks and language teachers to questions over job prospects. In some colleges, these vernacular programmes have become a popular draw for students from English-medium schools, too, given that it is easier to get a more 'covered' department.

The big picture: Opening the door

In line with the new National Education Policy (NEP 2020), the AICTE approved 1440 seats for B.Tech programmes in 11 regional languages — Hindi, Marathi, Tamil, Telugu, Kannada, Gujarati, Malayalam, Bengali, Assamese, Punjabi and Odia — across 18 engineering colleges for the academic year 2021-22. Three of these were government institutes and 15 were private. The move was part of the plan of including native languages as the medium of instruction in higher education to help increase access and promote the "strength, usage, and vibrancy of Indian languages," to begin with, engineering courses were offered in only five languages — Hindi, Kannada, Tamil, Telugu and Marathi — in 2021-22. And while colleges in Rajasthan, UP, MP, Haryana and Uttarakhand offered B.Tech in Hindi, those in Karnataka, Maharashtra, Andhra and Tamil Nadu offered the course in their respective regional language. Of 1440 seats, the data shows, only 233 seats were filled by these 18 colleges that year.

During the academic year 2022-23, however, the AICTE approved 1440 seats for engi-

neering in the local language in 22 colleges — four government, 18 private and most had 683 seats were filled with programmes in Hindi, Marathi, Tamil and Telugu.

Among the colleges that recorded a rise was Pune's Pimpri Chinchwad College of Engineering, a private college which offered admission to 65 students for its four-year computer engineering course in Marathi in 2021-22 against an approved intake of 60. While the AICTE allowing an additional division if needed, its enrolment increased to 74 students in 2022-23.

According to Nilkanth Chopade, deputy director of the college, English-medium students form the majority in the Marathi course. "More than 90 per cent are from an English-medium background. It is a demand and supply situation. For example, there is huge demand for Computer Science and if students fail to get a seat in an English programme they opt for the Marathi course," said Chopade.

The Noida Institute of Engineering and Technology (NIET) is another example. In Greater Noida, it had 19 students in the Marathi course in 2021-22. But it filled 68 seats against an approved intake of 60 in the computer science course in Hindi in 2022-23.

NIET director Vinod Kapase called the "favoured" programmes the "multifaceted approach." "We provide the students with field development projects and online programmes (by online providers) like Coursera so that they are well-equipped for placements," he said. NIET has also made English

language modules provided by the British Council mandatory. Similarly, Erode Sengunthar Engineering College, a private institute in Tamil Nadu, started a Mechanical Engineering course in Tamil with just 11 students in 2021-22 but managed to fill 49 seats against the approved intake of 60 seats in 2021 and 2022. Enrolment in Computer Science and Engineering in Telugu at the NRI Institute of Technology (NRIIT) in Andhra's Vijayawada, too, rose from 22 students to 50 in the approved intake of 60 in the same period.

Low numbers in Gujarat, Karnataka

Even as some universities did well, others had trouble getting in even one student. For instance, courses offered by institutes affiliated to the state-run Gujarat Technical University (GTU) failed to net a single enrolment. A case in point is Gujarat Power Engineering and Research Institute (GPRI) which offered 120 seats in Gujarat in one speciality courses like mechanical, civil, electrical and computer science engineering for the academic year 2022-23. In an effort to "boost" enrolment, GPRI even organised special counselling sessions for students at government schools and diploma colleges, besides those in Adavi hamlets in and around Sabardham district.

GTU Registrar N Kher said students have not yet warmed up to the idea. "Many students are interested for the programme but comfortable with English and we have tried to explain to them that learning will be more effective if done in a regional lan-

guage. At the diploma level, we have allowed students to study and write their exams in Gujarati. There is a perception among students that if they pursue B.Tech in Gujarati, they will miss out on placement opportunities," Kher said.

"The 'waning' appeal of core specialties may have contributed to the problem, too. "Another reason could be the declining popularity of core and electrical engineering in several foreign universities, studies have been studied their bachelors in the English medium. Currently, there are 10-15 per cent students who wish to study abroad. They have communicated this issue to AICTE," Bhaskar said.

Language cannot be barrier: AICTE

The AICTE, meanwhile, is hopeful of the tide turning gradually.

Rajiv Kumar, AICTE member secretary, said, "We have started faculty development programmes in Indian languages. We have given students options (to those regional language courses). Books are being translated in regional languages and efforts are being made to engage teachers to teach in regional languages. This multi-dimensional approach will surely help increase interest among students. But it will happen gradually. This is not likely to show results in just two years." Kumar said. "When we spoke to industry partners, no one expressed their unwillingness to hire students who had studied in regional languages. It is our mindset that makes us think the industry will not hire us." "Not a major barrier," he said.

the language. Nevertheless, I hold the lectures in Hindi with a mix of English to explain concepts better. The institute's programme makes it necessary to hold bilingual discussions," Sagar said.

This private institute, affiliated to Dr A P Abdul Kalam Technical University, is one of the success stories of the Government's move to introduce engineering degree courses in regional languages. Over the last two years, the institute nearly doubled its enrolment for the Hindi programme from 39 students in 2021-22 to 70 in 2022-23. It not only filled the approved intake of 60 in 2022-23, but also offered support to 11 seats for students from economically weaker sections (EWS).

Located in the National Capital Region (NCR), Kavita of the institute's students are

from English-medium schools. "Our students are aware of the importance of English and most also write their answer scripts in English," said Sansar Singh Chauhan, head of the Computer Science Engineering (CSE) department.

But the advantage, he said, is also for those who could not get into English-medium engineering programmes. "There is no difference in these two programmes, rather an option to be able to write in Hindi if not comfortable with English," he said. Several students at the institute echoed Chauhan's line.

"I had applied to an English-medium programme elsewhere but the cutoff was so high that I decided to opt for Hindi instead here. The programme is the same as English," said Divya Gaur, a second-year student.

"Computer Science is all about technique and coding, the practical knowledge of which remains the same for both CSE students and Hindi students," said Shreya, another second-year student.

It's no surprise then that in one of the top two Computer Science Engineering (CSE) sections in Hindi, 64 out of the 72 students had completed Class 12 from English-medium schools. According to college officials, the admission process remains common for both CSE core (English) and CSE (Hindi) students with a better percentile or a higher rank are given preference to join the core programme and the ones with comparatively lower ranks and percentiles take up CSE in Hindi. One must hold a minimum of 60 per cent in their 12th grade for admission and a rank in the joint

Entrance Examination to join these courses at the institute," said an official.

According to teachers, students do refer to textbooks prescribed for core subjects in English while the mode of teaching is in Hindi. "No translated textbooks are used. We use the AICTE to us and we don't have any plans of translating material as CSE is a very technical subject. Code is in Hindi and a verbal language. So there is no immediate need to translate the curriculum," said Chauhan, the CSE head.

The big question: placement?

The key question, however, is recruitment with the first-year batch scheduled to graduate next year.

"There is no difference in learning material and the curriculum as teaching happens from English textbooks but companies will ask, 'Why B.Tech in Hindi?' This might be a drawback as we may not be seen as candidates who are not fluent in English," said a second-year student.
