## Two top Maoists gunned down

Two top dreaded Maoists, carrying a cumulative bounty of Rs 1.16 Crore on their heads, were killed in a gunfight with security forces in Manpur-Mohla-Ambagarh Chowki district, a senior police official said on Thursday.

Vijay Reddy alias Suguluri Chinna alias Naganna alias Shankar (60) and Lokesh Salame alias Harsingh (37) were gunned down in an encounter took place in a forested hills of Banda in the Madanwada area when a team of security personnel was out on an anti-Maoist operation on Wednesday, Superintendent of Police Yashpal Singh said.

Shankar was active as the Dandakaranya Special Zonal Committee Member (DKSZCM) as the In-charge of the Rajnandgaon-Kanker Border (RKB) division while Salame was the Secretary, RKB division of the outlawed Maoists outfit. Shankar carried a bounty of Rs 25 lakh each in Chhattisgarh and Maharashtra and Rs 20 lakh each in Andhra Pradesh and Telangana states of the nation.

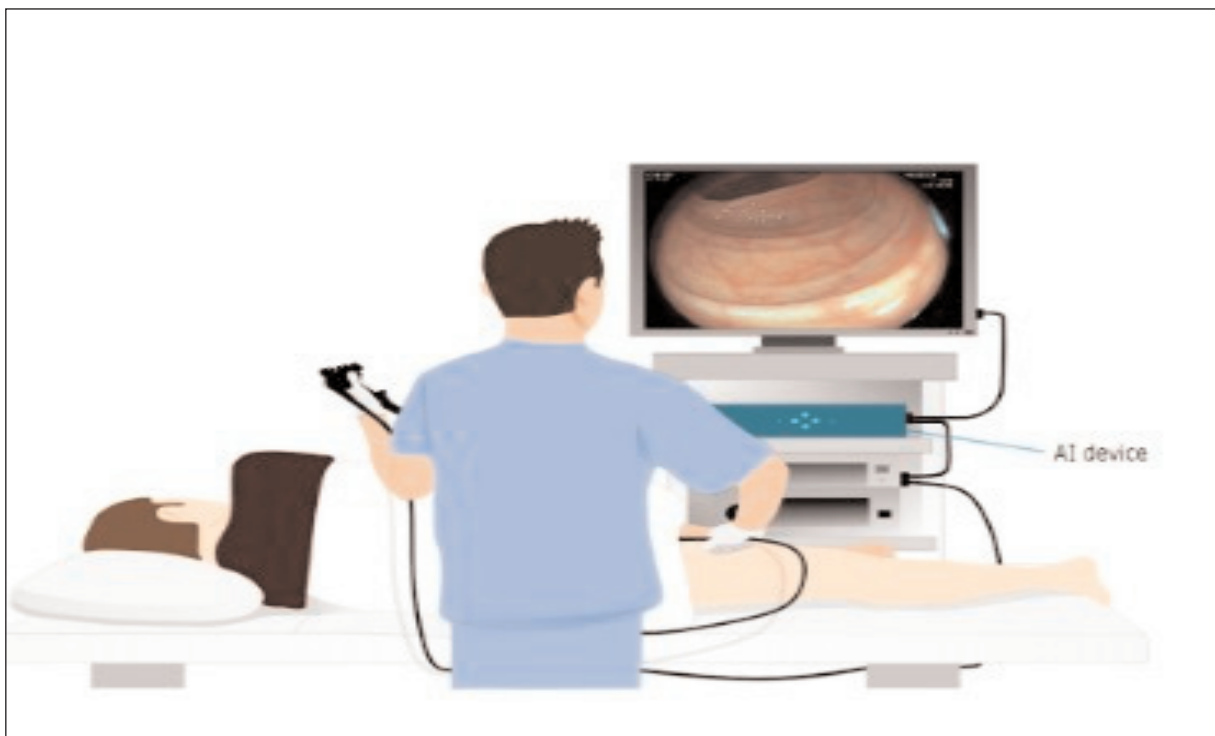
Salame had a reward of Rs 10 lakh in Chhattisgarh and Rs 16 lakh in Maharashtra respectively. A total of 20 warrants were



pending against Shankar and 10 warrants against Salame. An INSAS rifle, a .303 rifle, walkie-talkie, cordex wire, medicines, clothes and other items were recovered from the encounter spot. The Chhattisgarh Police,

District Reserve Guard (DRG), and the 27th Battalion of the Indo-Tibetan Border Police (ITBP) were involved in the operation launched on Wednesday based on the inputs about the presence of Maoists in the area.

## AI-assisted colonoscopies may raise deskilling risk among doctors: The Lancet

Amid increasing adoption of Artificial Intelligence (AI) in medicine, a new study published in The Lancet Gastroenterology and Hepatology journal, showed that doctors regularly performing AI-assisted colonoscopies may lose their ability to detect precancerous growths (adenomas) in the colon without AI assistance.

Colonoscopy, typically performed by an endoscopist, enables the detection and removal of adenomas, leading to the prevention of bowel cancer.

Numerous trials have shown that the use of AI to assist colonoscopies increases the detection of adenomas, generating much enthusiasm for the technology.

However, there is a lack of research into how continuous use of AI affects

endoscopist skills, with suggestions that it could be either positive, by training clinicians, or negative, leading to a reduction in skills.

“To our knowledge, this is the first study to suggest a negative impact of regular AI use on healthcare professionals' ability to complete a patient-relevant task in medicine of any kind. Our results are concerning, given that the adoption of AI in medicine is rapidly spreading,” said Dr Marcin Romanczyk, Academy of Silesia from Poland.

The study took place at four colonoscopy centres in Poland between September 2021 and March 2022.

A total of 1,443 colonoscopies were conducted without AI; 795 before the introduction of regular AI use and 648 after AI implementation. The colonoscopies were performed by 19 experienced endoscopists who had conducted

ed over 2,000 colonoscopies each.

The average rate of adenoma detection at non-AI-assisted colonoscopies significantly decreased from 28.4 per cent (226/795) before AI exposure to 22.4 per cent (145/648) after AI exposure, corresponding to a 20 per cent relative and 6 per cent absolute reduction in adenoma detection rate.

In the AI-assisted colonoscopies, there was a 25.3 per cent (186/734) adenoma detection rate.

The team also acknowledged some limitations, including that the observational nature of the study means that factors other than the implementation of AI use may have influenced the findings.

Romanczyk called for more research into the impact of AI on health professionals' skills across different medical fields.

## Czech Republic reports sharp rise in hepatitis-A cases

The Czech Republic has reported its highest number of hepatitis-A cases in the past 15 years, according to the National Institute of Public Health (SZU).

From January to the end of July this year, 1,053 cases were recorded, compared with only 168 in the same period last year. The number eventually rose to 636 cases for the whole of 2024.

This year, the highest numbers of cases have been reported in Prague (370), the Central Bohemian Region (181), and the Moravian-Silesian Region (113).

Hepatitis A is a viral liver disease spreading mainly through contaminated water, food, or direct contact with an infected person.

The infection, also known as infec-

tious jaundice, is affecting not only children but also teenagers, young adults, and people with high-risk behaviours - particularly drug users and the homeless. It is most commonly transmitted due to poor hygiene conditions and close contact in groups, according to the SZU.

The European Centre for Disease Prevention and Control (ECDC) has also warned of an increase in the transmission of the infection in Central Europe, with similar developments observed in Slovakia, Austria, and Hungary.

Commenting on the ECDC assessment, SZU Director Barbora Mackova said in June that the situation in the Czech Republic is not dramatic, but it should not be underestimated.

"It is necessary to adhere to consistent hand hygiene, regional hygiene sta-

tions are implementing targeted anti-epidemic measures, especially in areas with a higher risk of infection, such as excluded localities, communities of homeless people or drug addicts," she said. Currently, targeted vaccinations are being carried out for homeless people and other high-risk groups, including those who have contact with infected individuals. Experts also recommend vaccination for wider population groups, Xinhua news agency reported.

Hepatitis A is a liver infection caused by the hepatitis A virus. It's usually a short-term illness, but in rare cases, it can lead to liver failure and death, particularly in older adults or those with pre-existing health conditions. The virus is primarily spread through contaminated food or water, or through close contact with an infected person.
