

Assange starts final UK legal battle to avoid US extradition

London: Julian Assange's lawyers began their final UK legal challenge Tuesday to stop the WikiLeaks founder from being sent to the United States to face spying charges, arguing that his actions had exposed serious criminal actions by US authorities that were "of obvious and important public interest".

Assange himself was not in court. Judge Victoria Sharp said he was granted permission to come from Belmarsh Prison but had chosen not to attend. Assange's lawyer, Edward Fitzgerald, said he was unwell.

The 58-year-old has been fighting extradition for more than a decade, including seven years in self-exile in the Ecuadorian Embassy in London and the last five years in a high-security prison.

Navalny's mother exhorts Putin to release son's body

Moscow

The mother of Russian opposition leader Alexei Navalny, who was serving a 10-year prison sentence, appealed on Tuesday to President Vladimir Putin to intervene and turn her son's body over to her so she can bury him with dignity.

Lyudmila Navalnaya, who has been trying to get his body since Saturday, appeared in a video outside the Arctic penal colony where Navalny died on Friday.

"For the fifth day, I have been unable to see him. They wouldn't release his body to me. And they're not even telling me where he is," a black-clad Navalnaya said in the video, with the barbed wire of Penal Colony No. 3 in Kharpy, about 1,900 kilometers northeast of Moscow.

Delays in aid hit life on front line: Zelenskyy

Delays in weapons deliveries from Western allies to Ukraine are opening a door for Russian battlefield advances, Ukrainian President Volodymyr Zelenskyy says, making the fight "very difficult" along parts of the front line where the Kremlin's forces captured a strategic city last weekend ahead of the war's two-year anniversary.

Talks between PML-N & PPP end inconclusively

Bilawal Bhutto: 'Foresees a stalemate in formation of new govt'

ISLAMABAD

PPP Chairman Bilawal Bhutto-Zardari on Tuesday said he foresees a "stalemate" in the formation of a coalition government in Pakistan "if someone is not ready to change its stance", indicating deepening fissures in the country's political landscape.

His remarks came a day after the latest round of talks between the top leaders of Pakistan Muslim League-Nawaz (PML-N) and Pakistan Peoples Party (PPP) ended inconclusively on Monday as both sides failed to reach a consensus on a power-sharing formula to form a coalition government at the centre following a fractured verdict in the February election.

The PPP is reportedly asking for key constitutional positions of President, Chairman Senate, and Speaker of the National Assembly



for its support to former prime minister Nawaz Sharif's PML-N.

Speaking to reporters at the Supreme Court, Bilawal said the PPP and he were adamant on their stance, highlighting that it will not be changed at any cost, the Dawn newspaper reported.

"If someone else wants to change the stance, there can be progress. If they are not ready to change it, I foresee a stalemate," he said, adding that this would not benefit democracy or the parliamentary system.

"I want to give the PML-N a vote, I will have to give it on my terms and not theirs," the 35-year-old former foreign minister.

The delay [in forming the government] is because of non-seriousness," he said, adding that the situation is harming Pakistan's democracy.

Imran's party demands CEC's resignation over rigging in elections

Islamabad: Jailed former Pakistani prime minister Imran Khan's party on Tuesday reiterated its demand for Chief Election Commissioner Sikandar Sultan Raja's immediate resignation for failing to hold "free and fair" elections after allegations of massive poll rigging emerged. The 71-year-old former cricketer-turned-politician's Pakistan Tehreek-e-Insaf (PTI) party demanded the CEC's resignation, asserting that he had "no right to stay in the position for a single day", the Dawn newspaper reported. "After meeting Khan sahib today, the PTI demands that the CEC resign. He has no right to stay in the position for a single day," Barrister Gohar Khan said outside Rawalpindi's Adala jail, where the PTI founder has been jailed.

Israel orders evacuations in parts of Gaza

1 in 6 children are malnourished there

RAFAT (Gaza Strip)

Israel ordered new evacuations from parts of Gaza City on Tuesday as a study led by the UN children's agency found that one in six children are acutely malnourished in the isolated and largely devastated north of the territory, where the city is located.

The report finds deepening misery across the territory, where Israel's air and ground offensive, launched in response to Hamas' Oct 7 attack, has killed over 29,000 Palestinians, obliterated entire neighborhoods and displaced more than 80 per cent of the population.

Israel has vowed to expand the offensive to the Gaza Strip's southernmost city of Rafah, where more than half of the territory's population of 2.3 million has sought refuge from fighting elsewhere. Many have crowded into sprawling tent camps and overflowing UN-run

Houthi attack 2 US ships in Gulf of Aden

Sana'a: Yemen's Houthi group has announced that they launched missile attacks against two US ships in the Gulf of Aden, saying the hits were "accurate". In a televised statement aired by the group's satellite TV channel al-Masirah, Houthi military spokesperson Yahya Saree said on Monday evening that the attacks against American ships, Sea Champion and Navis Fortune, were "accurate and direct", without specifying the damages or casualties. According to Saree, the attacks brought the total number of Houthi operations during the past 24 hours to four. The first targeted a British ship resulting in its complete sinking. The second shot down a US MQ-9 drone in the airspace of Hodeidah. Governorate, while the last two attacks targeted two US ships.

"Our operations in the Red Sea and the Arabian Sea will escalate and will not stop unless (US) aggression [on Hamas] stops and the siege on the Palestinian people in the Gaza Strip is lifted," the Houthi military spokesperson said in the statement.

Italian woman jailed for faking 17 pregnancies, claiming benefits

Rome

An Italian woman who faked 17 pregnancies to make a small fortune in state benefits has been jailed.

According to Metro, the woman, identified as 50-year-old Barbara Loelle, falsely claimed that she had 12 miscarriages and 5 children over the period of 24 years. She received around 110,000 euros (approximately 90 lakh) in maternity benefits and she also racked up a considerable amount of time off work as a result of her fake pregnancies. But prosecutors in her case said that none of the children she had during her purported pregnancies were registered with the state and had never been seen by officials or anyone else.

According to the outlet, Loelle's alleged fraud was made possible by the theft of birth certificates from a clinic in Rome and other forged documents.

Loelle claimed to have delivered her latest child last December. However, police said that they had the 50-year-old under surveillance throughout the preceding nine months and that the whole pregnancy was a sham. They also accused the 50-year-old of using pillows

to give herself the appearance of a baby bump, as well as walking as if carrying the additional weight of an unborn child.

Loelle's partner Davide Pizzinato confessed to the cops that he knew "full well" that she wasn't pregnant. "It is indisputable, in light of the complete confession of Davide Pizzinato (Barbara's partner), that they participated in the crime of aggravated fraud to the detriment of the public body," wrote the judges in her sentencing, as reported by local outlet Clarin.

The outlet added that the woman presented false medical papers to collect state benefits. She and her partner "first deceived the Italian Health Assistance (ASL), which confirmed the requirements for early abstention from work and then presented it to the Istituto Nazionale della Previdenza Sociale (INPS) to obtain undue emoluments," the outlet reported. Pizzinato testified against Loelle in exchange for a lighter sentence, having also been charged as her accomplice in the fraud. However, the woman maintained her stand about giving birth to 5 children and having several miscarriages.

Hungary ready to clear NATO accession of Sweden

A vote in Hungary's parliament on ratifying Sweden's bid to join NATO could come as early as Monday, according to a senior member of country's governing Fidesz party. It would bring an end to more than 18 months of delays by the nationalist government that have frustrated Hungary's allies.

'Putin gifts Kim Russian car in show of special ties'



Russian President Vladimir Putin has gifted North Korean leader Kim Jong Un a Russian-made car for his personal use in a demonstration of their special relationship. North Korea's state media reported Tuesday.

The report didn't say what kind of vehicle it was or how it was shipped. But observers said it could violate a UN resolution that bans supplying luxury items to North Korea in an attempt to pressure the
